

**REPORT OF THE
FIFTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY AND BI-ANNUAL MEETING OF THE
AFRICA PLATFORM FOR REGIONAL INSTITUTIONS IN FISHERIES,
AQUACULTURE AND AQUATIC SYSTEMS (APRIFAAS)**



27 - 28 October 2022, RABAT, MOROCCO

I. INTRODUCTION

The African Union Inter-African Bureau of Animal Resources (AU-IBAR) and African Union Development Agency (AUDA-NEPAD) in collaboration with the Ministerial Conference on Fisheries Cooperation among African States Bordering the Atlantic (COMHAFAT/ATLFCO) organized the Fifth General Assembly and Bi-Annual Consultative Meeting of Africa Platform on Regional Institutions in Fisheries, Aquaculture and Aquatic Systems (APRIFAAS) in Rabat, Morocco, from the 27th to 28th October 2022. The theme of the meeting was “*Enhancing institutional collaboration for effective and sustainable regional fisheries management and aquaculture development*”.

II. OPENING SESSION

The meeting was presided over by Mrs. Patricia Lumba on behalf of the Acting Director of AU-IBAR, Dr Nick Nwankpa followed by Mr. Cheikh Tidjane N'dongo, the Acting Head of Food Security Unit, on behalf of the CEO of AUDA-NEPAD. The Executive Secretary of ATLAFCO, Mr. Abdelouahed Benabbou officially opened the meeting.

VI. RECOMMENDATIONS

- a. Fish Gov2 should endeavor to hold project meetings specifically in islands states of the African Union in order to strengthen institutional collaboration.

- b. We need to strengthen Common African position in global for a. It was recommended that more efforts need to be directed to encourage the AU member states to participate in global fora. Awareness needs to be created on their importance and RFBs and RECs should endeavor to create awareness. Furthermore, there are benefits accruing from active participation such as access to research funds needed to fill the research gap existing on the continent.
- c. The meeting requested secretariat to propose list of qualified and relevant institutions to be invited and participate in the 6th General Assembly. The list should provide brief description of each institution. The 5th GA accepted the membership of INFOPECHE by consensus.
- d. It was recommended to organize regional APRIFAAS meeting. Prior to the General assembly.
- e. The meeting recommended that the number of meetings per annum are reduced to one. Thematic area meetings and regional meeting could be organized followed by the General Assembly.
- f. The meeting suggested that the APRIFAAS bureau and Secretariat proposes theme for the upcoming technical and general assembly to include aquaculture, environmental issues, inland fisheries and MCS and prepare the background paper for inputs
- g. Strengthen effective collaboration, coordination and partnership between RECs to RECs.
- h. The meeting recommended that the communique be finalized and adopted in two weeks
- i. The APRIFAAS logo designed by COMHAFAT was approved

VII. NEXT MEETING

The next meeting will be held end of October 2023 in Morocco hosted by COMHAFAT. The background paper will be prepared for the meeting.

The fisheries and aquaculture sector in the economy cannot be over-emphasized. **Today, Africa's blue economy sectors and components generate a value of USD 296 billion with 49 million jobs.**

Despite this value, most African nations are constrained by a lack of resources and capacities to realize this potential due to competing development priorities. As Africa continues to recover from the **disruptions caused by COVID-19** and the **Russia-Ukraine crisis** impacting the continent's economic and social fabric, it suffices to state that the sustainable and equitable development of the sector is a potent mechanism to Africa's current and future development thrust.

Moreover, the statistics show the benefits of fisheries and aquaculture and could be sustained by implementing existing continental and regional policy frameworks to address multifaceted challenges of declining quantities of captured fish due to increasing demand for fish, destructive fishing methods, and **Illegal, unreported, and unregulated fishing (IUU)** driving fish capture beyond sustainable levels, and further straining the already weak capacity of our African institutions to manage their fisheries resources. Despite being one of the lesser polluters, the fish sector faces devastating environmental challenges, such as climate change and pollution.

Esteemed Participants, Ladies, and Gentlemen,

At the continental level, the AU, through the AU-IBAR and AUDA-NEPAD, is providing leadership for the development of the sector by establishing and implementing robust continental frameworks, including the **AU's Policy Framework and Reform Strategy for Fisheries and Aquaculture (PFRS)**. We must here note that the seven pillars of the PFRS provide alignment of the fisheries and aquaculture sector into the **Comprehensive Africa Agriculture Development Programme (CAADP)-Malabo Declaration** commitments.

The AU agenda on fisheries and aquaculture can be achieved with sustained and coordinated collaboration between AUDA-NEPAD and AU-IBAR and other key stakeholders and partners. This will continuously provide high-quality technical and relevant advice to our Member States to undertake policy and governance reforms effectively.

Recognizing the need for collaboration and partnerships to leverage each other's capacities, we have been working hard to create a conducive enabling environment and foster inclusive governance approaches.

In this regard, **establishing the APFRIFAAS** platform has served to increase coordination and improve opportunities for coordinated input into the AU policy and decision-making processes. This was evident through the successes of the **FishGov 1 project**, which facilitated the increased awareness of the importance of Fisheries and Aquaculture on the continent and catalyzed momentum toward improved governance frameworks.

The follow-up AU Programme for "**Enhancing sustainable fisheries management and aquaculture development in Africa – program for accelerated reform of the sector (FishGov-2)**" funded by the EU, provides an invaluable continuation of the achievement of the FishGov 1 project and aims to improve further food security, livelihoods and wealth creation in sustainable fisheries and aquaculture. Cependant, l'Afrique ne profite pas de son propre potentiel halieutique, alors que sa population continue de vivre dans un environnement d'insécurité alimentaire et nutritionnelle, de faim, de pauvreté et de faibles revenus. La pérennité de ces avantages potentiels est menacée en raison d'arrangements, d'institutions et de politiques de gouvernance inefficaces. De nombreuses parties prenantes et différentes institutions telles que les CER, les ORP, les Grands écosystèmes marins, États et les ANE sont impliquées dans les politiques de pêche et d'aquaculture.

Le Cadre politique et stratégie de réforme pour la pêche et l'aquaculture en Afrique (PFRS, 2014) stipule que la coopération régionale et sous-régionale entre les parties prenantes fonctionne de manière non cordonnée et que leurs actions sont généralement fragmentées ou incohérentes. Il est donc important de renforcer la coopération régionale sud-sud et de développer des mécanismes de coopération institutionnelle entre les différentes parties prenantes pour assurer la cohérence des politiques de pêche et le développement de l'aquaculture, dans la synergie et la complémentarité.

La COMHAFAT de sa part, a souscrit à cet effort soutenu, de renforcement de la coopération régionale sur le continent à travers les approches suivantes :

a) Renforcer la coopération régionale Sud-Sud, conformément au Cadre politique et à la Stratégie de réforme de la pêche et de l'aquaculture en Afrique (2014) :

- La COMHAFAT a développé depuis 2015, un mécanisme formel de coopération institutionnelle entre les ORP opérant en Afrique de l'Ouest (COMHAFAT, CPCO, CSRP, COREP), pour assurer la cohérence des politiques de pêche et de développement de l'aquaculture.
- La COMHAFAT et l'UA à travers l'UA/BIRA, ont signé en juillet 2018 un protocole d'accord, pour renforcer la coopération et la coordination en matière des pêches et d'aquaculture,

b) Créer des synergies et des complémentarités dans les programmes au niveau régional :

- Dans le cadre du MoU signé avec les organisations sous régionales, La COMHAFAT a organisé plusieurs sessions de coordination avec la participation de l'UA/BIRA -CEDEAO et CEEAC, qui ont abouti à l'élaboration d'un programme commun entre les organismes régionaux de pêche et. La COMHAFAT a fourni l'appui technique et financier nécessaires pour la concrétisation de certains projets retenus dans le cadre du programme commun.
- La COMHAFAT a facilité la création de coalitions régionales spécialisés, notamment :

Le Réseau des institutions de formation maritime (REFMA), Réseau des femmes opérant dans la pêche (RAFEP), Le regroupement des institutions scientifiques et de la recherche maritime (RAFISMER), Réseau des institutions publiques en charge de l'aquaculture (RAFAQUA), et le projet de réseau des médecins des gens de mer ;

c) Établir et renforcer le rôle des CER et des ORP dans l'intégration économique régionale :



La COMHAFAT est activement impliquée dans la coopération et la coordination régionales entre les CER et les ORP à travers la présidence de l'APRIFAAS, et l'adhésion aux composantes du **mécanisme Africain de réforme de la pêche**, et l'organisation, ainsi que la participation aux activités qui renforcent le rôle des CER et des ORP dans l'intégration économique régionale.

On reste Convaincus, que les mécanismes de gouvernance fondés sur la coopération internationale, régionale et sous régionale, ont une grande contribution à apporter au développement d'une pêche et d'une aquaculture durables et à la protection du milieu océanique, et à intégrer de façon harmonieuse, les problèmes émergents de l'environnement, notamment le changement climatique, les pollutions dans la gestion des ressources aquatiques vivantes.

Une réflexion engagée durant les travaux de ces ateliers, permettra certes, d'adopter les meilleures voies à emprunter, pour établir, les mécanismes de gouvernance fondés sur la concertation, la coopération institutionnelle régionale entre les parties prenantes en Afrique, dans l'objectif d'améliorer la gouvernance de la pêche, régénérer la biodiversité et les écosystèmes marins, participer activement et faire écouter la voix de l'Afrique dans les instances internationales, tout en apportant une contribution plus concrète, à la réalisation des ODD.
