


Definition and operationalization of the concept 2012-2014

- Elaboration of concept during PFRS preparatory process
- Consolidation of concept in PFRS final document titled Policy
 Framework and Reform Strategy for Fisheries and Aquaculture in
 Africa (2014) as approved by African Heads of State with the main
 emphasis in the text as follows:
- Common positions developed on high seas fisheries: this ensures the
 effective participation of African States in international conventions and
 access to high sees through the development of common positions on
 high sea fisheries.
- Other aspects of an African Voice were also implicit in this formulation and were further developed as the initiative developed



Further definition and operationalisation of the concept 2014-2018

- African voice actioned as a result area during FISHGOV 1 project
- Mombasa meeting on the African voice
- Initiation of membership process for African region tuna regional fisheries management organisations (IOTC & ICCAT)
- Participation in and support for African Union member states at international meetings with a start during COFI 2018
- Establishment of APRIFAAS (Africa Platform on Regional Institutions in Fisheries, Aquaculture and Aquatic Systems) and initial meetings
- Establishment of alliance with ATLAFCO and signature of MOU
- Establishment of continental platforms AFRiFISHNET, AWFISHNET



The 2017 Mombasa meeting I

- Workshop was to strengthen the voice of Africa Union Member States in RFMOs with specific objectives as follows:
- Assess the current status of the AU-MS participation in the governance of RFMOs;
- Examine the availability of scientific knowledge and basic fisheries data and identify apparent critical information gaps to measure the contribution of RFMOs to the AU-MS economy;
- Explore the constraints, including institutional and policy environment affecting implementation of recommendations/resolutions and other compliance issues of RFMOs by AU-MS;
- Identify priority actions to improve and consolidate the effective participation of AU MS in the deliberations of RFMOs and contributing to their strengthening for effective governance of high Seas fisheries resources.



The 2017 Mombasa meeting 2

Advancing work on the African Voice in an institutionalised way

- 1. The adopted mechanism should be a Coordinating Unit (CU)_with an advisory status within the existing structures of the Inter-African Bureau for Animal Resources (AU-IBAR) and Staff of the Coordinating Unit should be conversant with the international legal and policy, management, scientific and technical aspects of RFMOs governance.
- 2. The Unit should be entitled to contract MOU and or seek assistance from relevant organizations and others partners and be structured in such a way that it could be able to engage/interact with other relevant organizations e.g. RECs, RFMOs and Programmes.
- 3. Proposed name for the CU: AFRICAN VOICE for FISHERIES (*AVF*) and the budget of the Coordinating Unit should come from the regular AU-IBAR budget.



The 2017 Mombasa meeting 3

Functions of the proposed Coordinating Unit

- 1. Increase and consolidate African position and a voice in RFMOs;
- 2. Promote African Policies, notably the Policy Framework and Reform Strategy for Fisheries and Aquaculture in Africa (PFRS);
- 3. Develop and prioritize Plan of Action (POA) programs to facilitate the participation of AU-MS in RFMOs;
- 4. Review gaps (Institutional, legal, policy, financial, technical etc.);
- 5. Harmonize, coordinate and advise AU-MS in relevant RFMOs;
- Prepare background documents on issues relevant to particular RFMOs as well as common discussion points for AU-MS in preparation RFMO meetings;
- 7. Collect and disseminate relevant RFMOs information to AU-MS



- Operationalisation of the concept in FISHGOV 2 under a project result area – SO3.
- Africa is adequately represented and effectively participates in international fisheries and aquaculture fora and ably domesticates relevant global instruments.
- Output 3.1 Capacities of AU Member States including SIDS in terms of international negotiations are increased and a mechanism is put in place to coordinate African common positions.
- Output 3.2 Mechanisms are put in place to encourage and facilitate the domestication of global instruments and initiatives at continental, regional and national levels
- Output 3.3 Capacities of AU Member States are strengthened to effectively articulate African positions on fisheries and aquaculture in the AU-EU dialogue

- Creation of African Small Island Developing States platform with a
 focus on fisheries and aquaculture so far three meetings held –
 two in Seychelles and one in Rome and Rules of Procedure
 developed and under consideration by countries together with the
 initial process of creating an internal structure that is driven by
 the countries themselves
- Financial and technical support for participation of African Union member states in global meetings other than COFI - eg presentation of African common positions at 7 th meeting of OACPS Fisheries Ministers from 79 States Accra 5-8 th April 2022
- Operationalisation of PFRS at regional and national level such that there is no competing effort to offer an alternative approach



- Standing commitment to provide financial and support to African
 Fisheries Ministers requesting support; Support to Tanzania Minister for
 Fisheries to hold 2024 Summit on African Small-Scale Fisheries & Support
 to Madagascar Minister for Fisheries for 2022 intervention at COFI
- Joint projects with FAO, where FAO clearly recognises convening power of AU-IBAR and that the African Voice is associated with the work of AU-IBAR - Agreement between IBAR and FAO on Strengthening Institutionalization & Capacity for Strategic Planning among Non-state actor platforms, including small-scale fisheries
- Continued set of APRIFAAS meetings with enhanced participation and official procedures including election of Bureau officers and well attended General Assembly meetings including this current General Assembly



- Well received programme of work on ratification and domestication of
 international instruments operating at two levels (1) national workshops
 and consultations and assessments of degree of alignment of national
 laws and policies with global instrements in terms of both content and
 reception within the evaluated countries' (2) the creation of a mechanism
 within which there is a two-yearly meeting of all AU-MS to review the
 status of ratification of key fisheries and aquaculture instruments.
- The transfer/adoption of the programme of work on international instruments and the African Voice to the sister project on Aquatic Conservation and Biodiversity and the impressive programme of work achieved on these issues in the parallel but different arena of biodiversity conservation.



- Generation of actionable and effective policy frameworks that set out an African voice and approach on fisheries, aquaculture and the Blue Economy (PFRS, ABES) with worldwide recognition and acceptance of these frameworks as the principal African policy reference for these areas
- Increased and well organised participation in COFI and recognised role for African Union team (AU-IBAR and AUDA-NEPAD) in process under the guidance of the African Group of Ambassadors in Rome.
- Establishment of an African SIDS Platform for matters of Fisheries and Aquaculture and consolidation of internal arrangements of the group including their consideration and likely validation (with amendments) of AU-IBAR drafted Platform Rules of Procedure in 2025
- Consolidation of APRIFAAS



- AU-MS recognition of the availability of support to strengthen and deepen their participation in international meetings
- Extremely well received programme of work on ratification and domestication of international instruments



 Sustainability of these achievements from a financial point of view – African Union budgetary commitment needed rather than reliane on external partners who may not necessarily support the emerging African Unity and progress on matters of fisheries and aquaculture and Blue Economy.
