

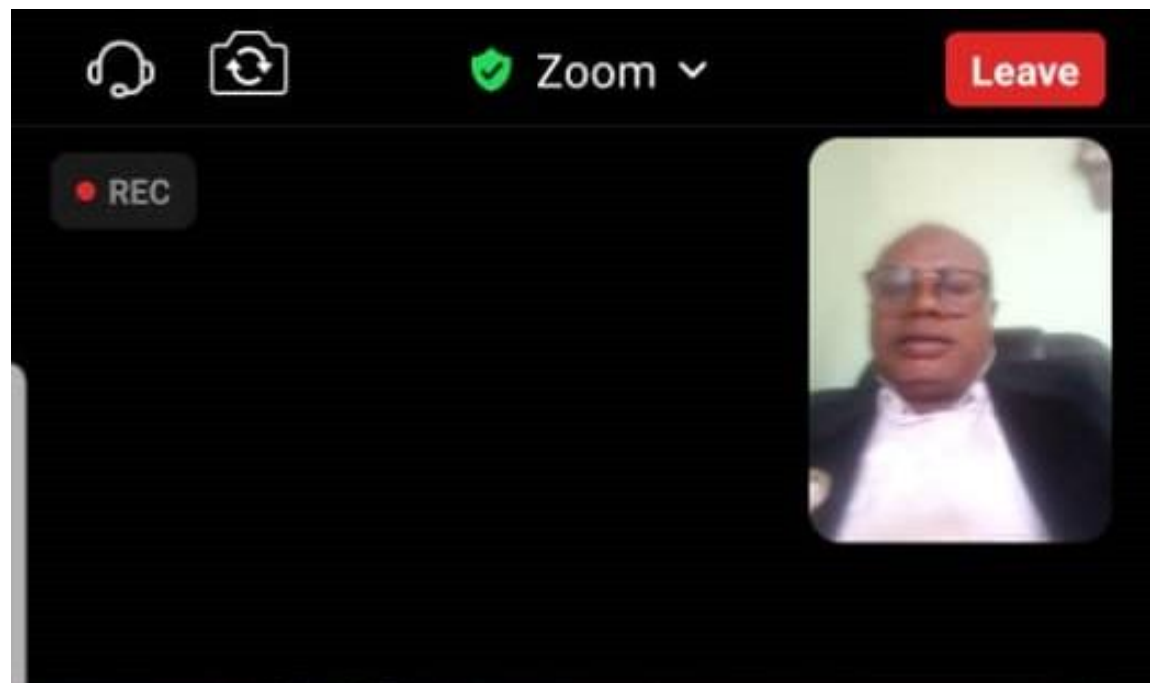

Project 1: Online platform

- Actions (timeline):
 - Training was provided by Madame Patricia Lumba at the Pretoria meeting of the 2A2E-V EC
 - 15 June all EC members signed up and active on the platform
 - The existing database of African VEEs must be updated by the consultancy before populating the platform (URGENT)
 - A template must be created by the consultancy for all VEEs to complete the required information by the middle of June 2022
 - By the end of July 2022 all VEEs must be listed and included – Responsibility of the consultancy
 - At the next GA the template must be fully functional and populated

Project 2: Accreditation (Prof Mohamed Ghanem)

Objective

- Establish continental quality assurance in veterinary education, training and research
- Aim: ensure that veterinary graduate attained minimum required skills and competencies allowing to work at continental level
- Project:
- 2A2E-V ACCREDITATION OF VEES: ESTABLISHMENT OF REFERENCE STANDARDS AND ACCREDITATION SYSTEM

Actions

- Setting academic standards for the African veterinary education (African Vet. Academic Standards - AVAS).
- Revision and recognition of AVAS by external referees (EAVEA of AVMA) supported by AU-IBAR
- Feedback from African VEEs about the AVAS
- Dissemination and training on the new AVAS through VEEs

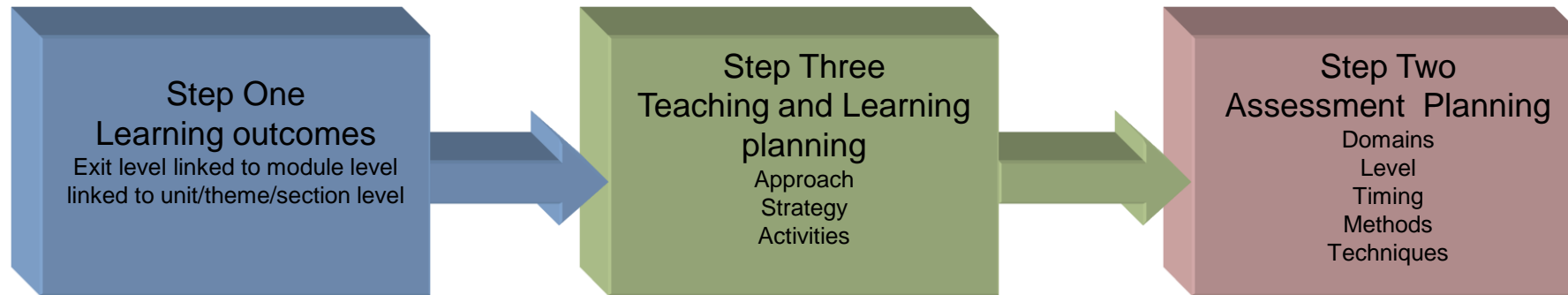
African Vet Accreditation System: Proposed process

- Establishing a system of accreditation of VEEs at Continental level recognized by the AU and AAU.
 - Formulation of board (EC plus continental qualified experts from regions)
 - Guidelines of the application process (required documents)
 - Portal for display of the AVAS (version 1)
 - Establish a platform of AVAS to provide online submission of documents
 - The visitation is mostly virtual with one person on site at the institution while the rest of the team are online.
 - Fees should be paid by the institutions to be accredited

Project 3.1: Curriculum

- The Day 1 Competencies for African veterinarians were concluded by 2A2E-V in 2021. These were based on the OIE (WOAH) Day 1 Competencies.
- These form the outcomes of the African Veterinary curriculum
- We agreed on the following:
 - a Backward Design process is promoted (Day 1 Competencies as outcome)
 - Broad guidelines are given by 2A2E-V, to allow for specific differences in institutions

Project 3.1: Curriculum

- General principles:
 - Institution must be accredited by the relevant local governance structure(s)
 - The veterinary programme must be accredited (academic accreditation) by the relevant higher education council or qualifications authority
 - The veterinary programme must be accredited (professional accreditation) or approved by the local Veterinary Statutory Body (VSB), where this exists.
 - Where VSBs don't exist, their establishment must be promoted by the institution
 - 2A2E-V takes note of the challenge created by political interference in the governance and **independence** of VSBs and the resulting accreditation systems involving VEEs

Project 3.1: Curriculum

- General principles:
 - Articulation directly into a Masters programme at least, and preferably with options for specialisation.
 - Curriculum review must happen at least once in 5 years
 - The required infrastructure must be available to support the training programme

Project 3.1: Curriculum

- Programme structure (any of the below can be integrated in any way):
 1. >500 hours of professional skills training (Communication, Entrepreneurship, ICT, Wellness, Community Engagement, Lifelong Learning, Transdisciplinarity)
 2. >1,600 hours of 100% work-integrated, at least partly community based clinical training (NOT classroom based)
 - Individual Animal Medicine, Surgery, Reproduction and supporting diagnostics
 - Epidemiology including Herd health, production medicine, disease control, extension and regulatory medicine
 - Public health including food security, food safety, OneHealth, agro-processing
 - Laboratory diagnostics including pathology (necropsies), clinical pathology, bacteriology, virology, parasitology etc
 3. >300 hours of research resulting in a research report (graduation project)
 4. >2,400 hours of pre-clinical and paraclinical skills-based training (PROBLEM SOLVING)
 5. >1,200 hours of foundational veterinary training (THE NORMAL ANIMAL AND ENVIRONMENT)
 6. STEM basis 0 – 1,200 hours depending on entry level of students

Project 3.1: Curriculum

- Assessment broad principles:
 - Theory – from knowledge base up to apply and create (guidelines to be developed by 2A2E-V)
 - Practical (guidelines to be developed)
 - Reporting: written and verbal
 - Portfolio of learning (reflection)
- The 4 above assessment modalities can be integrated throughout the programme, but **MUST** be applied to all 4 components of the clinical training programme
- No more than 5 - 9 students per veterinarian instructor in the clinical training programme.

Project 3.2: Day 1 Platform

- Initiative by Iowa state university
- Funding by Gates foundation
- Presidents of 2A2E-V applied and received the grant in collaboration with Ross University (for bovine materials)
- Objective:
 - Provide training materials on clinical cases for VEEs in Africa and the middle East.
 - Will be an open educational resource (OER) for Africa

Project 4: VetEdAfrica 1 – 2 November 2022

- As part of our joint missions to promote collaboration and enhance dissemination of innovations and good practice among veterinary education establishments, the American Association of Veterinary Medical College's Council on International Veterinary Medical Education (CIVME) and the African Association of Veterinary Education Establishments (2A2E-V) joined forces in planning a veterinary medical education conference at the University of Pretoria (South Africa) from 1 - 3 November 2022. The goal of the conference is to provide professional development specific to veterinary education to faculty at veterinary education establishments across Africa. The conference will be modeled after [the VetEd symposia](#) that have been successful in the UK and Ireland.
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- The focus of the conference will be on teaching and assessment of clinical skills, a need identified by 2A2E-V. We anticipate 5 attendees from each of the five regions of Africa with an additional 10 CIVME attendees and 20 faculty from the University of Pretoria for a total of 40-60 participants. The joint organizing committee hopes that this initiative will be an opportunity to bring Veterinary educators together and build a community of practice (CoP) to support long-term collaboration in the design and delivery of Veterinary educational approaches.

Project 4: VetEdAfrica 1 – 2 November 2022

- Proposed programme outlay:
 - 1 November: Clinical skills training. Keynote speaker Harald Bok (Utrecht, Netherlands)
 - 2 November: OneHealth education (OneHealth day). Keynote speaker Nitish Debnath (Bangladesh)
 - 3 November: Clinical skills assessment. Keynote speaker Sarah Bailey (Bristol, UK)
- Programme structure:
 - Keynote and workshops in the morning
 - Short (10 minute) presentations and posters in the afternoon

Project 4: VetEdAfrica 1 – 2 November 2022

- Other activities:
 - CIVME and 2A2E-V engagement
 - CIVME research grants highlighted or launched
 - Pre- or post conference tour to Faculty of Veterinary Science
 - Online / hybrid access
- Timeline:
 - Save the date and keynote speakers confirmed: End of June 2022
 - Call for abstracts middle July 2022
 - Fundraising completed July 2022 (mobility funding)
 - Abstracts close end August
 - Programme finalised end September
- Team:
 - 2A2E-V
 - UP
 - AAVMC
 - CIVME
 - Vetlink conferences

Project 5.1: Twinning inter-Africa (Prof Noursaid Tligui)

- A lot of benefits can be accrued in the current 2A2E-V through South-South and North-South twinning. Mechanisms have to be developed to facilitate these twinning arrangements as well as source funding for these twinning activities.

Project 5.1: Twinning inter-Africa

- Encourage bilateral twinning without any grant funding between VEEs where student and faculty members where administrative, bench fees etc are waived at the host institution – encourage initial mobility. The staff exchange can be used to bridge shortages of academic members staff in member VEEs – e.g. Veterinary Clinical competences and specialities; similarly students can gain these competencies from VEEs on the continent that may have the facilities and staff to provide these clinical specialities. VEEs on that continent that are willing to accept students and those with students looking for placements should notify other VEEs using the 2A2E-V platform. Contacts of responsible persons in the VEEs, conditions etc.

Project 5.1: Twinning inter-Africa

- Actions for 2A2E-V in the future:
 - MoUs between VEEs should be signed between all members of 2A2E-V to facilitate students and staff mobility.
 - A draft MoU template should be designed by the 2A2E-V EC and shared through 2A2E-V platform.
 - Funding opportunities should be recruited by 2A2E-V EC and distributed through the platform, and members should be encouraged to apply.
 - AU-IBAR should assist to identify collaborators and opportunities at a higher level.
 - Possible opportunities: WOAHA (OIE), FAO. EU. IAEA, Intra-ACP, GIZ, JICA, USAID, SIDA, Private philanthropists e.g., Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation, NGO etc

Project 5.2: Twinning 2A2E-V and AAVMC

- American Association of Veterinary Medical Colleges (AAVMC) showed interest in applying for a twinning project between AAVMC and 2A2E-V through the Gates foundation
- The 2A2E-V EC must continue discussions with AAVMC to finalise the application

Project 6: Centres of Excellence (Prof Adem Hiko)

Why the promotion of quality facilities at African VEEs

- In Africa,
 - the availability and quality of Veterinary Education Establishments (VEEs) is highly **variable** and
 - Reflects in **the quantity and quality of veterinary graduates**, various veterinary personnel and services in the different AU Member States.
 - **Inadequate competencies** among graduates from VEEs in Africa to meet the evolving needs of industry and society.

Emphasise on Veterinary training in future

According to Swan and Kriek (2009), the scope of veterinary training in **future will have to emphasise**

- veterinary public health,
- food safety,
- emerging diseases,
- international trade,
- bioterrorism, and
- biomedical research,

One-health system & interface focusing Vet. Education

- Within the context of a **one-health system** focusing on the interface between /amongst
 - wildlife,
 - domesticated animals,
 - humans, and
 - their environment.

Uniformity and strengthen of quality of VEEs

- Veterinary education needs to be strengthened globally (OIE, 2011):
 - Establishment of minimum requirements (a 'core curriculum'), as it relates to the delivery of national veterinary services
 - Harmonisation of key curriculum elements, to facilitate international mobility of veterinarians (day-1 Competencies) the establishment of quality control and recognition procedures for veterinary education establishments; and
 - The regulation of the veterinary profession by the Veterinary Statutory Body (VSB) at national level.
 - Introduction and running of Continuous Professional Development (CPD)

AU-IBAR announced for Centres of excellence in veterinary education

SELECTION AND DESIGNATION OF VETERINARY EDUCATION ESTABLISHMENTS AND ANIMAL HEALTH RESEARCH INSTITUTIONS AS AFRICA UNION CENTRES OF EXCELLENCE IN ANIMAL HEALTH

Suggestion of 2A2E-V executive Committee to promote quality facilities at African VEEs

- Need to consider the former 9 priority areas in to 5 priority area and re-announcement
- Inclusion of financial in the re-announcement
- Need to distribute the priority areas among 5 African region **based on** the performance through document assessment
- Need to apply for international funding agency
- **Sustainability and performance of centre of excellence**

Clustering the priority area in 5 area for easy distribution to the African Region

Area 1

- i. Veterinary Policy, legislation and jurisprudence (Regulations and trade in animals and animal products, strategies, etc)
- ix. Veterinary Education (pedagogical, assessment, clinical and skill training)

Area 2

- ii. Animal welfare
- viii. Wildlife Health and biodiversity

Area 3

- iii. Veterinary epidemiology (Biosecurity, import and export risk analysis etc)
- iv. Veterinary Public Health and One Health approach

Area 4

- v. Veterinary entrepreneurship and innovation (biotechnology, etc)
- vi. Veterinary Drug quality and Alternative veterinary therapy

Area 5

- vii. Clinical Veterinary medicine (by discipline and species differentiation)
